Chairs Report

Paul Hamilton

2013 has been a challenging year for BJA Hampshire Judo Committee. With major changes to the committee including officially being give the role of chair myself.

The current team has had to get to know each other and I feel we are all currently working well in the time we have to commit as volunteers although with many taking on multiple roles this time is limited. We could improve this with more volunteers coming forward to the committee.

This has meant we have had to decide where to focus our resources and left some older events to one side. That said although we had to cancel some of our events HBJA was listed as the county that put on the 2nd most competitions in 2013. This was primarily through the Hampshire Team Championships for Seniors running for a second year. A large thank you going to Lance Wicks for continuing to run these events after standing down from his committee position. also The Masters and Special Needs competitions.

The 2013 BJA Awards ceremony earned Hampshire members several awards to recognise their on-going support of Judo. Congratulations to Andy Tremlett, Nicky and Paul Sexton Lynn Stringer and Sarah Hopkins for their recognition.

Grants in the last year from Sports Hampshire and Isle of Wight, Hampshire County Council Sports England and the National Lottery Funds, acquired with thanks through Simon Lee and Peter Beard, Have allowed us to subsidise our events and allow us to start replacing the Contest areas held at Mountbatten and provide podiums, PA and IT equipment.

Our biggest issues are not financial but with manpower including Referees, officials and volunteers. Having to call them in from other areas limits the dates as BJA and SA have already committed them to other events. Also as they have to travel further raise the cost of expenses therefore entry prices.

Lack of volunteers for things like laying mats etc also cause us extra expenses when we have to pay venues to setup the event. (Mountbatten Leisure Centre costing up to 75% more for them to setup)

With thanks to grants we have had the funds to run events without a loss currently however on-going the events are supposed to cover their own costs obviously with your support we could also help reduce things such as Entry fees.

Communications

From our recent survey it surprised me greatly that people did not know what Hampshire Judo was or what support it gives to clubs. (Shockinglly one of my own coaches did not realise I was now the chair) This means going forward we need to be more transparent and provide better information to the clubs and more frequently.

We have been making an increased effort since January to reinvigorate our communication directly to the membership. We will endeavour to keep this going and hope that clubs also pass this down to their membership in case we do not have electronic mailing details for them.

We have also been using our website and facebook group to try and keep the membership up to date on what we are providing. We will strive to give as much notice of events as we can. We would also like the member clubs and players to provide any news they have also for us to include. Promoting these to your clubs would be incredibly helpful.

On-going and resource permitting we would like to create a calendar of events that will be focused more towards what the clubs would like having had feedback from those that took the survey such as Mini Mons competitions, reinstating the HTC for Juniors High Mon and Kyu as well as Technical Dan grading and.

However if we do not receive further support from the clubs with regards resources then we will have to prioritise the events to be run and cancel others.

Personally I think we can make this possible but we ALL need to take a part in OUR County committee to be able to make things work. With 50+ clubs then we only need 1 volunteer from each to have a superb team serving their own clubs.

Many hands make light work!

Secretary's Report

Simon Lee our Secretary, due to increased other commitments, had to resign in January, I'd like to thank him for his hard work during his time in this post. I agreed to step into this role as an interim secretary until the AGM. In addition during the course of the year Paul Sexton, Peter Powell and Danny Murphy stepped down from the committee, I'd like to thank them also for their contribution to Hampshire Judo.

I can't comment too much on the past other than to say that within Hampshire, we're not perfect as a Committee, but we strive to do our best. It's far too easy to look from outside in and say how poor we are without stepping up to help us get better. I've been involved in Martial Arts for over 30 years now and in my direct experience in Karate, Kung Fu, Tai Chi and Ju Jitsu the 'Politicking' within Hampshire's Judo community is the worst I've seen. We all need to stop this and positively work together for the benefits of ourselves as players, coaches, officials and parents.

We can all give feedback where needed, but let's consider how we do it and also where. Some of the posts that I've seen on social media leave a lot to be desired in terms of promoting Hampshire as being a good place to learn Judo.

Can I also remind you as Players and Coaches we need to ensure that we are all upto date with our BJA membership. A beginner is entitled to four weeks of lessons free which are covered by the BJA insurance, thereafter wards they must be a member of the BJA. If you are not a member of the BJA, then you are not covered by any of the BJA insurance cover that is in place. This is also true for coaches, that if your personal membership expires then your coaching insurance is null and void. Being a qualified coach means that you must have current 'qualifications' for DBS, First Aid and also the relevant revalidation courses, must have been attended, without this being in place, again the coaching insurance isn't valid..

British Judo Association Annual Awards

Congratulations go to Andy Tremlett who won a Gold Award at The BJA Annual Awards for his services to refereeing. Also to Sarah Hopkins who won Masters Players of the Year.

Nicky and Paul Sexton plus Lynn Stringer won Bronze Awards for their work as Officials and Fleming Park won a Bronze Award for Club of the Year at the BJA Awards.

Looking forward there are clearly a number of areas that we need to improve upon within Hampshire Judo including the following. I believe that the three key ones are:-

Communications

In future we will strive to post news/information/updates onto our website and Facebook page. These are commonly accessible by the majority of members.

We will email directly to Club contacts when necessary and will ask Peter Beard to email members directly when necessary also. (It's important to note that Hampshire Judo do not have a list of all Hampshire BJA members only registered club contacts.)

Meeting minutes will be published onto the website and facebook page and members are reminded that the Committee meeting are open for visitors to attend.

Planning of events

For a number of reasons, we haven't been great at forward planning within Hampshire, we need to improve this to allow us all to manage diaries better and to maximise the chances for success of each event that we run.

Resourcing

We need more people on the Committee to be able to do the things that members are asking us to do. Many people are generally busy in their working/home lives, so to add another extra in terms of working on the committee is a big ask. If we can share some of the key jobs that need to be done, it will have a huge impact on what we do and what we are able to deliver to Hampshire Players. If we aren't able to find the necessary resources, then this will compel us to limit our activities.

Table Officials' Co-Ordinator Report

During the past year Hampshire officials have supported various events within the county. These events include 5 Hampshire Team Championship events, the Hampshire Open and 4 Hampshire Kyu and Dan Gradings; not forgetting the popular under 12s judo event at the Hampshire Games. We have also supported additional events outside Hampshire including local area and county events, Midland Area events, and several National events including Sheffield etc. Not forgetting the Hampshire Closed, after which will be this year's AGM.

Unfortunately due to changes in procedures, and personal commitments we have not been able to put on a training course within the county during the last year. We are hoping that we will be able to host a course later in the year to upgrade some of our existing officials, and to encourage others to try their hand at becoming time-keepers – the first step on the officials' pathway, and a ticket to one of the best seats in the house at judo events. If space allows, we would also like to offer these courses to our colleagues from other counties. If you know anyone who is interested please ask them to contact me via officials@hampshirejudo.org.uk

As a county we usually have enough qualified Time-Keepers to cover our events, but we still struggle to supply sufficient officials of Competition Recorder level, as there are still only 2 of us in the county. There is currently no-one qualified to Senior Recorder level, although Pete Blakemore a Senior Recorder from Moonrakers Judo Club in Salisbury, just over the border in Wiltshire, willingly volunteers to support our events whenever possible. We are lucky enough in Hampshire to have Paul and Nicky Sexton, and Andy Grand, who are all fully qualified to run competitions of all levels. I am extremely grateful to all the officials who regularly give their time, and the effort they generously volunteer, so that we are able to put on a variety of events in Hampshire. A **BIG** thank you to everyone, we couldn't survive without your continued support.

I have sent out a calling notice to our known officials in Hampshire, asking if they are available to help at any of our planned events, thank you to everyone who took the time to reply, it is a great help knowing if you are going to be available at various times throughout the year, whilst also being useful by letting me know in plenty of time whether I will have to extend my search outside the county to cover the shortfall in suitably qualified officials.

I keep on about qualified officials, let me please give a quick explanation. At BJA competitions there is an expectation that qualified volunteers will cover the various aspects of the administration side of the competition. This is usually after attending a suitable course to qualify, and after passing an examination to show that they fully understand the theory. They will then get the chance to test their knowledge practically at a suitable competition, usually under the guidance of another experienced official of at least the same grade or higher. Believe me there is a big difference between passing that exam and putting what you have learned into practice at a busy competition! But we all work together in our judo family, giving each other moral support to boost our confidence. All of which is vital when it comes to supporting the most important people at the competitions – our players.

Referees Report

Referee Report – 2013/2014

Within Hampshire we have 5 active senior referees and 1 active junior referee

We are also supported in most events with referees from the Southern Area, NHC and Western Area

The Hampshire referees continue to support events in Hampshire, Southern Area and other areas surrounding Hampshire. They are also regularly called upon to support national events.

In the last year there have been 2 referee courses held at AWE (thanks to AWE for making facilities available). Unfortunately although all candidates passed (the first course) they have not been seen out on the circuit. There appears to be a problem with keeping new referees. (at the time of writing, details for the 2nd course were not available).

Competition events in Hampshire:

We had a Judo Day in July where everyone was invited to attend for “a bit of everything”. One of the proposed sessions was to cover the new rules. Unfortunately attendance was very poor.

We also had a day where we held a Special Needs event in the morning and a Masters Open in the afternoon. Both events were well attended and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves.

Lance Wicks has also arranged the Hampshire Team Championships (HTC) which run on the first Sunday of the month for 5 months at St Mary’s in Southampton. This is one of two event types that we (Hampshire) are self sufficient.

Gradings – this is the second event type where we (Hampshire) are self sufficient.

Without more Hampshire referees, we will always have to request assistance from other areas/counties which will increase the cost to run the event.

In the past, most referees would have had a chance to try refereeing at gradings. With the changes made which means there are now fewer gradings, we have lost the ability to give people a change to “give it a go” in a safe and (relatively) stress-free environment. If anyone has any ideas on how we can improve this situation, please let me know and we can discuss.

Additionally, the offer to attend any club and/or training session to present a session on the rules is still available. Please contact me to arrange.

Finally, a big thank you to Don Turnbull (and his wife) who manages the callings for referees to support Hampshire events. Without his (their) support we would have no referees from outside Hampshire attending and supporting our events.

County Coaches Report

Derek Hopkins

Following the appointment of the BJA's Regional Technical Officers, there have been changes in the way that coach's qualifications are revalidated the majority courses that are run are following a National Syllabus and are therefore subject to the BJA's timing.

We can however request certain courses to be run at times.

There are 105 coaches in the county, about 20 of which have lapsed which may be due to the changes made by the Government. The old CRB check is now the DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) Check and the document that is sent confirming the check is now sent to the applicant, but not to the BJA. Therefore some of the lapses may be due to the BJA not having a copy. However some of the lapses are quite longstanding. So they will be checked out.

I am quite willing to take requests for specific courses to be scheduled so please let me know what you think you require and I will contact the RTO – Chris Doherty – to arrange.

We are thinking of running a Kata course for grading with the new Kata for Competitive Dan grading's and using that as an additional revalidation for coaches.

Competitions Report

2013 – 2014 has been a year of transition for Hampshire Competitions

I would like to thank again Lance Wicks for stepping in and working hard to organise events for Hampshire.

He has continued to organise the HTC's which have been very successful with growing interest as the year progressed.

I have again taken over the role of Competitions Organiser and working from a restricted profile I have tried to arrange events for the end of this AGM year and have been frustrated by the changes at the last minute which have caused these either to be postponed or re-organised.

Due to a change of dates by the Southern Area, the Inter Counties Team competition was moved to 27th April. Welfare Officers Report

2013 – 2014 has been a quiet year on the Welfare front.

Issues that were raised and reported at last years AGM, in respect of welfare, were in the main dealt with.

I would like to thank Club Welfare Officers for their assistance to Clubs and, therefore, Hampshire. It is not a role that has a high profile but it is one of the most important to ensure the respect and safety of Players and Coaches alike.

Occasionally there are minor complaints that need no further action than a level headed approach to being resolved. This is where a Club Welfare Officer takes the lead.

Most problems are and should be resolved at a local level, the only need to contact myself was if there was a bigger issue. This brings me on to one complaint that was resolved but never went away.

The nature of Judo brings young persons interacting with older children and adults. This could be at Club or Competition, wherever it occurs it is the older persons responsibility to act appropriately. (No matter what the situation the older person can step away and diffuse the issue)

It is always in the media regarding child abuse, either physical, emotional or sexual. There is also peer pressure as well as bullying. Whatever the circumstances it has no place in Judo

Due to Data protection and professional status it is not right for me to go into specifics by either naming or giving sufficient information to identify the persons concerned.

One matter reported to me should have been dealt with and in fact was, unfortunately one of the parties wrongly assumed that an identification had been made due to minutes in a Committee meeting.

I had spoken to the person concerned at length and reached an agreement whereby, an acceptance of what took place was wrong and that action taken, went on too long and could have, and should have, been avoided.

In the loosest sense of the word I accepted this to be a form of an apology, my request for a written response was initially agreed, however, due to a later misunderstanding this never occurred.

Having brought the matter to the attention of the Southern Area and BJA it was decided that it was to be resolved locally. Action was taken at the time and that response by the Committee has not been revoked.

There are no outstanding Welfare Issues.

BJA Service Manager – Hampshire Annual Operating Report

Service Manager for Hampshire & South West & National Project Manager – Key Outcomes

1. 14+

The University Campaign:

Through the Student Voucher Scheme (SVS) we subsidise new players by offering a reduced price Gi, free membership & first grading.

Winchester University Judo Club – I created this club in September 2010 & BJA Hants are supporting it through the continued loan of mats.

The club has had a complete change in committee & coach. When I was at the Freshers Fair this year recruiting potential new players, strangely, compared with all the other years, we hardly attracted any new beginners, instead there was a core of existing judoka, pleasingly all in their first year.

Up until Christmas Glen Judd was the coach but unfortunately couldn't maintain it due to commitments at the City JC & Football coaching. Since then the club has had some guest sessions from coaches and one student and one University staff member are undertaking coaching qualifications to ensure sustainability & some consistency at the club which is great news.

Winchester University Judo Club has gained **1 new Judoka** through the SVS.

Southampton Solent University Judo Club – Chris & I created the club in September 2011. The club now has two training sessions a week where Lance Wicks is the coach.

I visited a session & delivered a suit but as per with previous years the level of student involvement is low.

Southampton Solent University Judo Club has gained **1 new Judoka** through the SVS.

Southampton University Judo Club – A well established club. I keep in touch with Coach Gary Hill, deliver suits & help where required.

Southampton University Judo Club has gained **10 new Judoka** through the SVS.

Portsmouth University Judo Club – This operates through Jon Patterson's Priory JC. I attended the Freshers Fair with the Captain & Vice Captain to try & recruit new players.

Portsmouth University Judo Club has gained **2 new Judoka** through the SVS.

2. Sportivate Projects (14-25 years)

Sportivate is a funding pot where 6, 7 or 8 week introductory sessions are put on, in the hope younger people will become more active as a result. I have secured external funding & supported an application from Shin Gi Tai Martial Arts Academy in Hants, meaning an investment in judo being in the region of **£2,200**.

Working with the county committee & securing the **£9,125** last March meant that I could engage with more Colleges through a combination of the new mats & Sportivate funding. We continued our relationship with Peter Symonds for a fourth year, expanding more easily through the new College Sports Maker staffed positions into Queen Mary's College, South Downs, St Vincent's and a failed project at Fareham College.

As a result, **41 young people** have now experienced the sport with around **28** going on to have **memberships**.

This has involved a number of meetings with key partners such as Colleges, local authorities etc & working with spreadsheets, costings, budgeting & reporting.

3. Other Funding & Small Grants

Small Grants is a fund where applications are considered from £300-£10,000. One has been submitted by the University of Winchester which I assisted with for **£5,700** for new matting & we await news on.

I have also assisted 5 coaches in Hampshire signposting & supporting their applications to funding pots to subsidise their attendance on UKCC L2 courses. Around **£2,100** has been saved by the coaches as a result.

4. Judo Development Groups (JDG)

We had one existing group which we expanded & now consists of: Winchester, Winchester College, River Park, Fleming Park & Alresford.

I established a second which has had limited buy-in to date, consisting of: Summit, AWE, Shin Gi Tai, Brighton Hill & Newbury.

The idea of the JDGs is to localise discussions & workings but the betterment of those involved. I have facilitated & chaired the meetings, often highlighting funding opportunities, resources available. I brought in external speakers such as Priya Samuel from the County Sports Partnership to discuss Satellite Club funding opportunities & invited the local Sports Development Officers. We have introduced a practical element with Chris Doherty taking the coaches on to the mat after the round the table section.

5. Clubmark

A few clubs have shown an interest in Clubmark this year but not as many as in the past. Clubmark is about to be re-launched with new resources, additional benefits & more. Congratulations must go to **Shin Gi Tai Martial Arts Academy** who are newly Clubmark accredited, well done to them.

6. County Sports Partnerships

I have had various meetings throughout the year with Sport Hampshire & IOW, keeping them in the loop with what I am doing & also to revisit the service level agreement to ensure they are working for both parties as well as attending the Forums. Therefore I have a strong relationship with Sport Hants & think that they have an understanding of Judo.

7. Premier League 4 Sport (U16s)

This year the PL4S project has continued in Portsmouth with Jon Patterson delivering at Milton Cross school (as a satellite to Priory JC) where he is coaching a group of around 8 attending.

From my perspective I want more from the project & I again think the coordinator at the club has been poor however very recently a new person has been appointed & I will be meeting with them to discuss plans moving forward.

8. National Project Manager

Having this role & responsibility means I have been the lead on the Club Incentive Programme. This is a pilot scheme which provides additional support & resources rewards those clubs whose membership increases. We are 2 months into the 6 month pilot. It will then be reviewed & future direction defined. The clubs serving as part of the pilot are: Fleming Park, AWE, Summit, Alresford & Shin Gi Tai. I have been responsible for this from top to bottom, producing all of the resources & documentation.

The Queen's Baton Relay, similar to the Olympic Torch Relay, in aid of the Commonwealth Games is another priority as part of our broader picture of another Summer of Sport. We will again be working with national partners Join In who I will work with.

I have re-written large amounts of the text & re-designed the Club Development pages of the website to make them more user friendly & valuable for the Judo family; I am just awaiting these alterations to be implemented.

9. Other attendances & works

- This last year I have covered the South West as well as Hants & haven't noted any of this workings here.
- Working with Fighting Chance to highlight opportunities & clubs that might want to be involved.
- Attended BJA Team Meetings.
- Attended the majority of Hampshire Judo committee meetings & AGM.
- Attended some Southern Area committee meetings & AGM.
- Completed various DBS checks for volunteers.
- Worked at the European Cup in Crawley.
- Produced a new reporting document with statistics on every single club, their membership, month to month, those expired, lapsed & expired - a big undertaking.

The Future of Hampshire Judo

Hampshire Judo is at a stage where we need to carefully consider what we are focussed upon and how we prioritise our activities in order to move forward in the best possible way.

There are a number of key topics to for the Committee to look at and we'd welcome input from others:-

Committee Structure

The Constitution stipulates that there must be an Executive Committee of Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. However do we need named Management Roles?

For example given the way that the BJA are currently working, do we need a County Coach to mirror the same work?

Given that the previous three incumbents to the Competitions Coordinators role have struggled to get wider support from the Hampshire BJA Membership to help them. Rather than one person doing this role, should this be a team role?

Prioritising Events

Given the current lack of resources on the Committee, we can't successfully arrange all the events that we would like to make happen.

Currently Gradings are happening fairly successfully, although we go do with publicising them better.

The challenge is that the competitions that we need/would like to run. During 2014 we'd like to run in addition to the Hampshire Closed, An Open event, A Special Needs Open event, Hampshire Games, A Yellow belt and under event and a Split Grade event. Members have also asked that we hold more events aimed at juniors (age and ability). (I haven't included the Hampshire Team Championships in this list, as Lance Wicks does a very good job of making them happen)

Yes we need to forward plan these events to make them happen, but we also need to ensure that we can deliver them and this with the current resourcing is proving challenging.

Key questions. What do we prioritise to make happen? How do we engage more 'helpers.' Would clubs be willing to run these events with support from the Committee?

Hampshire Squad

Danny Murphy ran a number of squad training sessions in the last year, but the attendance was at best sporadic and sometimes just 2 people turned up to train.

Is there just not the enthusiasm to have a Hampshire Squad? Is it a lack of events for the team to attend, do we need to prebook events to attend and take part in so that we have 4 or 5 competitions a year for the squad to focus up. Do we need to help fund some of these costs for a squad?

(By squad I also include Special Needs Players)

Development pathways for players/coaches and officials/clubs

How can we help and encourage players in their development and also in the progression to become coaches and/or officials.

What else could we could be doing to support clubs?
